



But Score Gains Are Relative



Reading 65 min This passage is adapted from Adam Smith, The Theory of Moral Sentiments, originally published in 1759. Smith was a key Scottish Enlightenment figure, whose earliest writings focused on his moral philosophy. These writings provided the ethical foundation for his later, more famous economic treatise, The Wealth of Nations.

However selfish man may be supposed to be, there are evidently some principles in his nature, which interest him in the fortune of others and render their happiness necessary to him, though he derives nothing from it except the pleasure of seeing it. Of this kind is pity or compassion, the emotion that we feel for the misery of others, when we either see it, or are made to conceive it in a very lively manner. That we often derive sorrow from the sorrow of others is a matter of fact too obvious to require any instances to prove it; for this sentiment is by no means confined to the virtuous and humane, though they perhaps may feel it with the most exquisite sensitivity.

As we have no immediate experience of what others feel, we can form no idea of the manner in which they are affected, but by conceiving what we ourselves should feel in the like situation. Though our brother is upon the rack, as long as we ourselves are at our ease, our senses will never inform us of what he suffers. They never did, and never can, carry us beyond our own person, and it is by the imagination only that we can form any conception of what are his sensations.







A Sensible Timeline: 11th Grade

- □ SAT or ACT Decision: Fall of 11th grade at the *latest*
- □ 1st Official Test: <u>SAT</u> (March) <u>or ACT</u> (Feb)
 - Prep begins 4-5 months prior (Winter Break)
- Official Test: <u>ACT</u> (April) or <u>SAT</u> (May)
 - Refresher prep and practice tests
- SAT Subject Tests (2): May or June
 - □ Practice Subject Tests can gauge readiness
- □ 3rd Official Test (Optional): <u>ACT</u> (July or Sept) <u>or SAT</u> (Aug or Oct)

ACT Math: Structure & Pacing


Structure:

- 60 questions in 60 minutes
- Content breakdown
 - 23% Pre-Algebra
 - 17% Elementary Algebra
 - 15% Intermediate Algebra
 - 15% Coordinate Geometry
 - 23% Plane Geometry
 - 7% Trigonometry

Pacing Concerns:

- Average 1 minute per question*
- Difficulty escalates steadily throughout
- Problems at the end are much harder but worth same points
- Rushing and cherry-picking can be dangerous

ACT Math: Difficulty Distribution




Data reflects performance of several thousand first-time ACT takers on eleven different tests.


ACT Math: Where to Invest Effort
