Accommodation Support

"Can I receive accommodations in college?"

- Colleges don't have the same legal obligations as high schools
- Colleges provide accommodations to eligible students under Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)
- "Legally required" or "reasonable" accommodations.
- The requirements and documentation can vary from college to college.



Academic and Executive Function Support

There are no case managers in college.

- Student Support Specialist/Learning Support Specialist
- Assists with anything from educational planning, goal setting, time management, organization, and learning strategies.
- Gives students an opportunity to talk about academic and non-academic topics.
- Support self-advocacy

Community and Mental Health

- Community spaces for students with learning, attention, and social differences.
- Social events geared toward these students
- Cultural and Resource Center
 - Spaces to celebrate diversity, get involved, and meet new people; i.e. Disability Cultural Centers, LGBTQ Affairs, Women and Gender Resources, African American Student Affairs, etc.
 - Spaces to find resources for First Generation Student, students from foster programs, Military members, etc.



Community and Mental Health

- Access to mental health services:
 - Therapy services
 - Access to medication on campus
- Community awareness and safety
 - Blue Envelope Program: Supporting individuals on the autism spectrum who make have trouble interacting with officers during traffic stops





Accessibility

• Documentation

- Is updated documentation required?
- What type of documentation is acceptable?

• Diagnoses

- Is a diagnosis required?
- Can a diagnosis be done at the college level?

SALT CENTER HIGHLIGHTS

- Established in 1980
- Unique to The University of Arizona
- Strictly academic support (Not a school-within-a-school)
- 35 full-time professionals
- 650 students enrolled each semester
- Historically: 85% in good academic standing (GPA of 2.0 or higher!)
- Fee-for-service (The SALT Center is financially self-supporting)
- 3 primary service components



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Three Primary Service Components

Student Support Specialists

- Primary contact for the SALT Center
- Transition Support
- Time management and Organization

Tutoring

- Tutors certified to support students with learning and attention differences
- Tutoring options: <u>One-on-One</u>, <u>Study Groups</u>, <u>Math & Science and Reading & Writing Drop-</u> <u>In</u>

Educational Technology

Technology support in and out of the classroom





Supplemental Supports

Psychological Services

- Brief, solution-focused therapy for SALT students
- Provided by therapists from ABLE Clinic, a public clinic in Tucson
- Online or in person

Wellness Events

- Support during stressful times in the semester like mid-terms and finals
- Therapy dogs, yoga, massage therapists

Community Events

- Social events for SALT Students
- Boardgame nights, movie nights, group campus event attendance
